**Additional:** It is anticipated that the “Rim” and the “Empire” fires will burn together forming a single fire with a continuing threat to the communities of Concow. The “Smokey” fire burning along Hwy 32 made a run yesterday afternoon when the inversion layer lifted and still poses a threat to the communities of Butte Meadows and Jonesville. Weather changes over the next few days are expected to occur with the increased possibility of thunderstorms and lightning activity throughout the region. If the inversion layer lifts, fire activity and intensity will increase prompting possible further evacuations and significant fire spread. Numerous Fires are burning throughout Central and Northern California causing a significant amount of smoke in the valley areas. Residents need to monitor the fire situation in and around their area via the local media. If conditions change, fire and law enforcement officials will make immediate notification to keep the public informed.

Due to the large number of significant fires throughout the State of California firefighting resources are limited. Incident Commanders are setting priorities to protect life and property.

As July 4<sup>th</sup> approaches fire officials are asking that citizens use extra caution in preventing new fires that would tax fire resources.
